#### LETTER FROM THE EDITOR


At the start of the season, the PSA revamped the constitution of its tournaments and added a new category: with the prize money going from 20 to \$30,000, the Monte Carlo Classic became a "Copper" event and is part of the PSA Squash Tour after being a Challenger for a few years. It means that the ranking points are included in the Road to Tour Finals.

Such as a blacksmith, the number of tournaments is forging ahead which is good for athletes. This week, they had the choice between a \$15k in Costa Rica, a Bronze in Malaysia and Monaco, very popular among players due to the quality of the organization. On Wednesday, she had to dig deep, physically and mentally, against a fearless Hana Ismail (WR 81), who never stopped attacking for more than an hour. The end of the match was filled with incredible rallies. and the defending champion relied on her experience to prevail in the business and win 11-7 in the fifth.

"She's had some good results, I did study her game and knew what to expect, she is very aggressive and hits some hard lines. If you let her dominate the middle of the court you are in trouble, the key for me was to find a way to break her down and it was far from easy. Credit to her, she had no pressure and played well.


